Early in March, ARC made the difficult decision to shelter in place for the safety of our staff and the 400 cats and dogs they care for. We have faced hurricanes, economic disasters and the mass exodus of Lee County citizens during the economic collapse of 2000-2008. Nothing really prepared us for this but we knew if COVID-19 entered our gates our entire staff, as well as Board members, would have to quarantine. For this reason, we closed to the public and also asked our volunteers to "take a pause" in order to protect themselves and remain our second "line of defense."

During this period of time ARC continued to intake pets that needed emergency care or whose owners suddenly and urgently were no longer available. By utilizing area veterinary clinics for initial intake, pets could receive their initial assessment and either move straight into surgery or be transferred to ARC. Daniels Parkway Animal Hospital, Blue Pearl Pet Hospital and VCA Coral Veterinary Hospital played an instrumental role in flowing pets in need to us in a "protected" fashion. We are deeply grateful for all their safety protocols that kept us both safe!

It has been a rocky road for all of us and one of ARC's largest fundraisers, Casino Night, fell victim in April to social distancing. We had high hopes this event could take place in July but in an abundance of safety it is far too apparent this would not be a wise decision. Meantime we cling to the belief that you will find a way to continue to support ARC's mission to Rescue, Rehabilitate and Re-Home. If you feel you are in a position to help keep our foundation secure, during this critical time, we'd be profoundly grateful.

As we return to full operations once more, we have implemented some changes. You can now submit an adoption application online and be pre-approved and assigned a dedicated time slot to come to ARC and engage in meet and greets. In this way, your experience is streamlined and personalized. These new procedures worked so well in May and June that we are making it a permanent part of operations. No rush, fuss or bottlenecks so sign up and come visit us! We missed

you!

# Bentley - a Beautiful Journey



What began as a very unfortunate accident could easily have been the end of Bentley's story, but it wasn't! We were told a tool box fell off a bar stool and crashed onto Bentley's spine causing hind leg paralysis. We were told it was a recent injury but no skin wounds or fractures. Both back legs had severe muscle atrophy, his tail and hind end had severe hair and skin loss due to dragging.

Whatever Bentley's story was he was of little use to his owners as a breed dog and being incognizant this tea-cup Yorkie was isolated on a brick patio. He needed ARC fast and entered foster care. First item to concentrate on was an exam to confirm his paralysis. Next, we focused on emotional issues. He was afraid of touch, fearful of noises, reluctant to eat, never barked and rarely moved. Within a week he welcomed head pats and daily brushing to tame his mats. Bentley learned to eat and drink out of dishes, accept the noise of kitchen activity and family room gatherings. He even made some feline friends! Critical to his health was acceptance of bladder expression and allowing us to flex his semi-frozen joints.

And then, Bentley won the "lotto"! A new long-term foster home consisting of an amazingly kind hearted woman named Jean and her two Yorkies, Paris & Prince, agreed to help Bentley continue his journey to recovery! This trio really brought out Bentley's friendly personality and he definitely preferred Yorkies to cats!

Jean shifted the focus to Bentley's physical rehabilitation. Schedules for physical therapy three times a week and acupuncture twice a week began. Gunnar's Wheels Foundation loaned a mini-wheelchair for Bentley's long-term usage and he was off to the races! Oh, the glee of watching three Yorkies racing around the family room is just beyond words!

We are thrilled to report that nerve feelings are returning to Bentley's back legs, he can now wiggle his tail and can balance on all four paws when eating. Recently he tried to take his first step on a treadmill! We feel certain that continued physical therapy and acupuncture will result in further progress. If you are as hopeful as we are please consider a donation towards Bentley's medical care which runs \$210 week for therapy and \$130 a week for acupuncture. Any amount helps towards Bentley's future success!

Randall Schoonover, Peggy and Lisa (Board members) and even I jumped into action to bridge the gap and give staff a hand. Finally, after a month and a half of being closed, we opened our doors to volunteers again! Lisa Viola (Board Secretary) and senior volunteer Siobhan Raven, along with Glyn Raven, organized a celebration that included a BBQ. This day was made a very special one indeed.

We could not be more grateful for all the help we receive from our volunteers! Socialization makes a world of a difference for our residents and prepares them for adoption! Thank you, volunteers, for all the help and dedication to our organization as we just could not accomplish all we do without you.

# Casa Luis Cats - a Very Special Group Indeed



As I walk up to the FIV house, I see and hear numerous faces and meows warmly greeting me. I reply, "Good morning Gent, Rudy, December, Carhart, Yogi....I could go on and on. These are some of the nicest and sweetest cats on property at ARC....BUT, they live with a "stigma", as they all test positive for FIV "Feline Immunodeficiency virus." This is a virus that weakens the immune system and is spread by two ways: being bitten deeply by an infected cat during a territorial fight or during mating. FIV cannot be transmitted to humans or dogs!

Although these cats live with FIV, many will never show symptoms and can live a long and symptom free life, just like any other cat. All an FIV cat asks for is what any other cat requires; quality food, fresh water, annual wellness exams and the safety of living indoors! Veterinary studies have now concluded that an FIV positive cat can cohabitate in a home with another cat who is negative for the virus, as long as there are no fighters and all cats are spayed/neutered.

So next time you call to make an appointment to view our kitties for adoption, please consider adopting one of our FIV kitties. You just might fall in love, as I have. Peggy Gore - Executive Director ARC.









## Can Our Summers Get Any Hotter?

It sure seems so. One of the biggest dangers to your pet? Heat stroke, which occurs when excessive body temperature takes place. In serious cases, irreversible damage and even death can occur.

Common causes of heat stroke include dehydration, elevated body temperature, confinement in hot unventilated spaces and prolonged exposure to sun. It is also important to restrict exercise and walking to early morning or late evening times. Keep in mind that hot pavement surfaces can burn the pads of your pet's paws. If you cannot place your hand on the blacktop for more than 7 seconds do not walk your pet on it. Short legged pets feel the heat radiating off pavement even more so than tall pets!

Symptoms of over-heating can include weakness, muscle tremors, excessive salivation, elevated heart rate, dark blue or bright red tongue and/or gums. If you suspect your pet is over-heated, move them into a shady or air-conditioned area, place a cool wet towel underneath and offer small amounts of water frequently. If body temperature is over 104, spray cool water on him and create a breeze. Once lowered to under 103

degrees, get your pet to the nearest veterinarian. Be sure your car is pre-cooled!

Very young kittens and puppies cannot regulate their body temperatures so providing a safe temperature is even more critical for them. Protect your pets and enjoy the summer in safety!
