

Harmful Algal Blooms: Protect Your Furry Friends

Red tide is not a new phenomenon in Southwest Florida, but this year it has gotten a lot of national attention. Florida red tide is higher-than-normal concentration of algae in the Gulf of Mexico; most commonly the species named

Karenia brevis. Brevetoxin can lead to large quantities of fish to die and also affects birds, mammals, and sea turtles. Since waves tend to break up areas of these algae, it can become somewhat "airborne" and lead to respiratory irritation for people while lounging on the beach. The algae can also irritate your skin after swimming. For our pets, it's recommended to not have them swim in areas that are having a red tide bloom. The water can irritate their skin, their respiratory system, and can make them sick if they eat the dead fish. Let's hope conditions improve soon so we can get back to enjoying the beaches again!

Additionally, with many areas of canals and the river experiencing severe algal blooms, many people are wondering if this could be harmful to their pets as well. The biggest concern for toxicity is Blue-green algae, often referred to as Cyanobacteria. This grows in fresh water- the rivers, lakes, and estuaries. Cyanobacteria can produce a toxin,

cyanotoxin, in two varieties that are particularly harmful. Microcystins can lead to acute liver failure with symptoms such as lethargy, vomiting, diarrhea, jaundice, and seizures. Anatoxins are neurotoxins that primarily cause tremors, seizures, paralysis, and gastrointestinal signs. Both of these toxicities can lead to sudden death. It is important to emphasize that just because water has visible algae, even with a "blue-green" color, it does not automatically mean it is the potentially toxic Cyanobacteria. That distinction is made microscopically. However, it is quite important to pay attention to the news and when you see water that has that appearance, keep your family (including your furry family members) away from that water source. Dogs may still try to drink this foul smelling water, or eat the dead fish that are frequently found nearby. This is how they most commonly succumb to illness. Seek veterinary care immediately if you believe your pet has ingested this water. Going the Extra Mile: Riley

When a beautiful young Labrador Retriever like Riley, comes into ARC, we all expect her to find a home quickly. This was not one of those stories. Riley's story exemplifies that "ARC doesn't do easy".

Riley is a 5 year old Yellow Lab with a delightful personality. She was surrendered to us in December 2017 when her owner could no longer care for her. She had a skin infection, ear infection, urinary tract infection, and was limping on her right rear leg. She was started on medications to help all of the infections, and the limping was suspected to be a torn cranial cruciate ligament (comparable to an ACL tear in people). She was evaluated by Dr. Goodrich, a Board Certified Orthopedic Surgeon, at Florida Veterinary Referral Center (FVRC). She had knee surgery performed and then the long recovery period began. 8 to 10 weeks of activity restriction is not what most young Labs enjoy!

We really hoped that she would be available this spring for adoption, but, Riley tore the cranial cruciate ligament in her other knee during her recovery period! It is estimated that 80% of dogs who have damage to one, will go on to damage the other. Riley had her left knee operated on in June, and is nearing the end of her recovery period now. We know that when she is finally available for adoption, Riley will get the life she has always dreamed of. At ARC, we are always happy to go the extra mile for our residents. Riley didn't have a short story with ARC, hers had lots of twists and turns.

But we know she will find a very happy ending to her story with us.

ARC's Training Center Gets a Huge Update!

The *Gribble Canine Training Center* was originally conceived as a building in which to work with our borderline-adoptable dogs in the hopes of making them behaviorally and emotionally ready to go to forever homes. It's original iteration did not include central air or running water, and the floor plan was very open. Over the years, this beautiful building's role has been expanded greatly. It has become our canine intake area; a place for new dogs to spend their first 10 days, assuring their good health and easing their transition to the outdoor area of the shelter. The "TC", as we call it, has also made emergency mass intakes possible. ARC has been able to help many more animals from our own area, as well as other parts of the country because of this space. We've saved hundreds of dogs from local hoarding situations, hurricanes and flooding situations from other parts of the country like the Carolinas, and poverty stricken areas like St. Landry Parrish in Louisiana. The TC also protected the lives of our own animals by providing shelter for our canines during Hurricane Irma last year. This one building, gifted nearly a decade ago by ARC's single-most generous and compassionate donor, has made the saving of so many lives possible.

We had found so many life-saving uses for this building, but were realizing that it's interior was no longer optimal for the things it was used for most. So, we approached that donor about the possibility of overhauling the interior to better suit its main purpose. Of course, she was on board! The TC now has a beautiful, functional new interior. Chain link fenced pens have been replaced by 14 shiny new, easy to clean kennels of varying sizes. We added running water and installed a wonderful new dog washing station. The building now also has central air conditioning, as well as brand new high-efficiency ceiling mounted fans. It's the ideal structure in which to intake, treat, and acclimate our new canine residents. Thank you, Ms. Gribble!
